

KIT Runs Biggest German University Cloud

“bwSync&Share“ Online Memory Service Can now Be Accessed by about 450,000 Members of Universities and Colleges in Baden-Württemberg

The Karlsruhe Institute of Technology (KIT) has started operation of the online memory service “bwSync&Share” for the synchronization and sharing of documents. The state-wide service is available cost-free to about 350,000 students and 100,000 employees of all universities in Baden-Württemberg and, hence, represents the biggest university cloud in Germany. Every user can now access about ten gigabytes of memory capacity at his workplace and via mobile devices. The memory service is funded by the State Ministry of Science, Research, and the Arts.

To cope with current research tasks, scientists of various institutions are forced to increasingly cooperate. Consequently, there is an increasing demand for tools supporting such a cooperation. Joint processing and easy, secure, and flexible exchange of documents among universities are indispensable.

“bwSync&Share“ is a memory service developed by KIT’s Steinbuch Centre for Computing (SCC) in cooperation with the Power Folder company. The service is to provide for the exchange of data among various users, computers, and mobile end devices. Research results, homework, photos or videos can be stored, shared, and synchronized. Access takes place via desktop systems, smartphones, tablets, or web interfaces. This ensures maximum comfort for the user. In the starting phase, 500 terabytes will be supplied for “bwSync&Share” in Karlsruhe. The memory capacity per user is limited to ten gigabytes.

“In contrast to other known services like “Dropbox” or “Google Drive”, the data are not stored at server locations abroad, but at KIT’s Large-scale Data Facility. Hence, the service is subject to German law. Employees and students of universities and colleges in Baden-Württemberg do no longer have to trust external cloud services, but can cooperate easily and safely via this state-wide service,” Nico Schlitter, head of the project at SCC, explains.

The data of the bwSync&Share users are stored at the Karlsruhe Institute of Technology (KIT) and, hence, are subject to Germany law. Communication between the end devices of the users and the central memory systems is encoded. Data access is restricted to the user supplying the data and other users authorized by him.

Use of "bwSync&Share" is cost-free for members of the state universities and colleges. Members of other institutions can also use the service, but do not possess a personal memory space.
